Title:	Home Health Medication Education: How to Ensure Compliance While
	Remaining within the Scope of Practice

Overview of Presentation:

For many older adults, the ability to remain independent in one's home depends on the ability to manage a complicated medication regiment. Older adults are the largest users of prescription medication, yet with advancing age they are more vulnerable to adverse reactions to the medication they are taking. Approximately 30 percent of hospital admissions of older adults are drug related, with more than 11 percent attributed to medication non-adherence and 10-17 percent related to adverse drug reactions. Older adults discharged from the hospital on more that five drugs are more likely to visit the emergency department and be re-hospitalized during the first 6 months after discharge. (Merek & Antle; 2008)

To mitigate risk, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) established multiple incentives for home health agencies (HHA's) to participate in medication management. These include penalties for re-hospitalization, positive financial incentives impacted by STAR ratings and patient satisfaction surveys. As of January 13, 2018, CMS has included medication instruction as a mandatory condition of participation (COP)

In order to be compliant with the COPs, home health agencies must ensure that medication instruction is provided and documented for all patients. The SLP should not be excluded from this responsibility however, many are tenuous in providing this services. Reasons may be due to knowledge deficit with regard to pharmacology, state licensure parameters, or scope of practice. A cautious approach to medication education will help guide the SLP to determine what the best practice for this requirement is. Gathering all of the data and information highlighted in this presentation will empower the SLP to decide to move forward or defer to another professional. Having the necessary knowledge, tools and resources may assist the SLP in deciding to move forward with this important responsibility to their homebound patients, thus maintaining the value of their service within the home health industry.
